U. High got rolling late in the first period and scored its initial touchdown early in the second quarter with Steve Nusser carrying the ball over.

During the third quarter the Marion line with the aid of penalties kept U. High from scoring. Weakness of offensive blocking prevented us from making a touchdown.

In the final quarter Nusser made a couple of long gains and soon scored from the third line. Later U. High recovered a Marion fumble on the twenty-five yard line and again it was Nusser who scored.

Our passing attack failed completely. Marion didn't have a kick blocked all night but McCalley was hard pressed every time in getting the oval away.

MARION 6 MONTI 0

Marion downed Monticello 6 to 0 at Monticello Friday, September 28 in a wet, cold game. This was Marion's initial WaMaC conference tilt and was an improvement over U. High's game, especially in line play. This showed up very plainly in the first quarter when Monti was one foot from "pay dirt." Marion held, Monti fumbled and we recovered. The half ended 0-0.

Midway in the third quarter, Gable intercepted a Monti pass on the thirty yard line. Two plays put the ball on the fifteen yard line. On the fourth down Eastman passed to Horner who scored standing up.

Late in the final quarter Monti Pushed the ball across,

only to be called back because of an offside penalty. The game ended 6-0 in our favor. DH
