



Marion's chance to gain a place in the WaMaC conference as a leading team was shattered Friday night as Manchester landed the Indians a 12-0 setback.

The ball game was far from being a one-sided affair. Both teams were hard driving all the

way.

In the first half there was fine blocking and tackling on both sides and several goal line threats, but neither team scored.

With a 0-0 deadlock in the score, the Manhawks came back in the second half of the game to receive the kickoff and march down to score before losing possession of the ball. The try for conversion failed. The game ended 12-0.

MARION VS ANAMOSA

The Marion Indians outfought and outplayed the Anamosa team

all the way.

Marion received the kick off and started an immediate drive for the Blue Raider's goal only to lose the ball on a fumble. The visitors took over and were forced to punt. This time Marion's drive was not stopped. Gable scored from the 47 yard line on a beautiful run. A Mc-Calley to Whittemore pass made it 7-0.

In the second quarter. Mottinger scored from the 20 yard line to end another drive, but

the conversion failed. This made the score 13-0. Anamosa also scored just before the half and also made the conversion. The score of the half 13-7.

In the final quarter a long Anamosa pass to a "sleeper" made the tying score and a nice place kick split the uprights for the winning run. The final score 14-13.

TIPTON TROUNCES MAKION

The Tipton Tigers really poured it on Marion Friday to take the last game of the season 25-6. Tipton scored on the opening kickoff when Nabors took the ball on his own 10 yard line and raced 90 yards for the touchdown.


Tipton scored again in the second quarter on a quarterback sneak from the one foot line.
