Marion's hard fighting cagers dropped a tough one to a lanky Anamosa five Tuesday night. This game marked the opening of the Wa Mac Conference schedule.

Gable scored the first two points for Marion. Then the Raiders scored with the first quarter ending 10-5, and the half ending 14-9.

The second half opened with Mottinger pouring in a fast two points to begin the most exciting quarter of play. Midway in the quarter Mac Slater tied the game on a free throw, 17-17. Marion's hopes were high but began to fade as Anamosa came back to end the quarter 21-18.

During the last quarter the Raiders piled up 14 points to Marion's 8 and closed the ball game in an Indian defeat 35-26. The second string dropped the opener 27-12.
