EDITORIAL

For the benefit of you who don't realize how much time and work goes into each Vox, here is a summary of the preparations.

First, a meeting is held about three weeks in advance of the time the paper comes out. At the meeting new ideas are brought forth, suggestions are made, the deadline is set and the topics are assigned to various people. Then during the following days the feature writers chew their pencils, praying for an inspiration. Sports writers review the games, while the editors pender over the editorial. The artists draw, tear up and draw again a suitable cover, cartoons, and fifteen to twenty ads. A dummy copy is made which will help the staff figure how many more articles are needed.

As the stories come in the spelling, phrasing, punctuation and authenticity are checked by the proofreaders, editors and the faculty adviser. Then the articles are sent to the typing room where they are first x-ed out, retyped and checked again. Next, the stencils are typed and if any errors are made they must be corrected. Then these stencils are checked again for accuracy.

At last the typists run off the paper on the mimeograhp--several hundred copies of each page. The pages are then sorted, stapled and resorted, which takes up to 6:00 or 6:30 on the eve before the Vox comes out.

Everyone breathes a sighthe Vox is ready for distribution. Now the shaff can begin to worry about the next issue, which must be bigger and better than the last one.

And when the writers see their articles in print they feel like the man who said, "An ill-favored thing, sir, but mine own."
