The cast is as follows:



The game was not as one sided as the score reads. Marion led by five points at the end of the first quarter and also at the half. The halftime score being 18-13.

In the third quarter the Maroons began to pull up and at the beginning of the last quarter the score was knotted at 23 all.

This is where the home team began to get hot. Fischer and Edwards poured through the remaining 17 points to give the home team 40. Fischer accounted for 9 of the 17 points to make him high point man for the evening with 21. Gable was high for Marion with 11.

The reserves also lost 29-20. Bunting was high point man in this game. DH

Marion's determination to win their last home game of the season gave the Indians the lead most of the way as the first quarter ended with a score of 7-6, the half 15-13, and the third quarter 23-17. In the last few moments the score was unfortunately close, but the Indians got a 3 point lead and held it. Gable was high for Marion with 11 points. For Tipton, Naber was high with 17 points.

The reserves victory was a surprise, with only 15 seconds to play Tipton got a one point lead and with less than a quarter minute to play Whittemore shot from behind the 10 second line, score, 22-21! Bunting was high with 9 points.
