

At this point Coach Barnard put in a new five that picked up the tempo to take over the lead 16-13 at the halftime.

The Indians came back strong in the third stanza to overhaul the lead and take a one point margin to begin the final quarter

Here again the Ramblers substituted, putting in the original five to score 9 points to our four. Then taking a four point lead took to stalking the remaining few seconds to conquer 30-26.

Kurt was high point man for Marion having four field goals for 8 points, McCalley 7, and Gable 6.
