Note: this is not the story of the circular staircase, nor the spiral staircase, but the <u>souare</u> staircase.



Marion will again be host to at least two more interesting track and field events before the season ends.


On May 11, the Northeast Iowa district track meet will be held here. This will bring many fine Iowa athletes to Marion.

The third Annual Marion Relays was held Saturday, April 13, at Marion's Athletic Field. It was the nicest day the Marion Relays ever had. It was a day of constant broken records. Seventeen relay records were broken, two were tied, and the 8th grade 440 yard relay record was broken. This means that all the records of the meet were tied or broken with the exception of just four.

In the Field Events Mckinistry of East Waterloo broke both the Shot Put and Discus records with Willimack of DeWitt taking second both times. Ray Yeakly and Bob Lambertson of Roosevelt (CR) and Cedar Falls (Teachers) tied for first and broke the Pole Vault record by doing 10'6''. The other two new records in Field Events were Hollingsworth of East Waterloo Broad Jumping 21'5'' and Jesperson of Cedar Falls doing 5'8'' in the High Jump.

The two who tied the old records were David Fisher of Mt. Vernon doing 16.2 in the 120 yard high hurdles and Hamel of Franklin doing 10.4 in the 100 yerd dash.
