

Dark, small, pretty---a good student---likes mince pie---wants to be a millionaire----always smiling----a Senior----nickname "Dottie".


Freckles, short, and talks with a drawl --- doesn't like girls ---learning to type---has a car-always laughing --- in the Senior play -- red hair.

Brown hair----pretty----recently married --- a good sport ---helps with the Guill----always gets around to MacBeth. MR


Farewell Seniors!

DUAL MEET WITH MONTICELLO

The Monticello Panthers came to Marion Thursday April 25, for a dual track meet with the Marion Indians.

Monticello managed $47\frac{1}{2}$ points to Marion's $74\frac{1}{3}$. Paulson helped the Panthers out by winning first in the Discus Throw, the Shot Put and the High Jump. Williams won the Broad Jump, High Hurdles, and tied for the first in the Pole Vault with Bob Etzel.

In some of the other races Wainwright won the 220, Hastings won the 880 and Neil Wood won the Mile Run. Marion also won the Mile Relay.

VINTON ANNUAL HELAYS

One of Marion's best performances of the day was winning the 2-Mile Relay. The four participating in this event were Benedict, Wood, Peterson, and Hastings. They led all the way to win an easy victory.

It was late in the month of August when a group of fellows, anxious to play football, joined together to "get a look" at the new coach.

They had their first game September 21 against University High of Iowa City. The team we fielded was a "green" one except for our two lettermen. The team won one game and tied one--losing the remainders by "tough-breaks" usually.

With the month of December came basketball and many new contestants who, until this time, had not participated in sports, but were willing to give this sport a try.

We won but five of the regular scheduled sixteen games; the last two games in overtime periods and many others by close margins.

In the sectional tournament we dropped a close one to Wilson by a 30-26 margin. We had to play on a floor they had played on before and against Bill Bernard's so-called "Double-Shuffle."

After basketball came the track season. Many eager runners reported with hopes of being great.

The team has done good so far this season. Marion took fifth at the Vinton Relays and won the 2-Mile Relay by 100 yards or better.

The District Track Meet and the WaMac Conference Meet are still to be held in Marion.

The Marion Relays were held April 13 and were a great success. DH
