After the ads are finished the stencil goes to the typists who have received the okayed articles from the editor which are then typed. The finished stencil is checked by the proof reader who then hands it to the Business Manager department to be printed. The editor and assistant editor hand them to the home rooms.

This paper is to come out every two weeks on Friday morning during home room period. Special editions may be published with the permission of the principal.

It is the hope of the staff of this paper that the Vox may be a bigger and better newspaper for the coming year.

MARION WINS FIRST GAME

Outweighed but not out-
fought, eleven Marion Indians
turned back an invasion from
Cedar Falls 6-0. The statistics
were even more in favor of the
Indians than the score indicated
however, and they threatened at
pay-dirt many times during the
game but failed in their final
efforts to score.

Marion's score came in the
first quarter when Cedar Falls,
backed up against their own goal,
fumbled and Potter pounced on the
ball in the end zone. That was
the extent of the scoring but
there were several sensational
plays by Potter and Marsh and
some thrilling passes from Meg-
gers to Lary. The heavier Cedar
Falls team made most of their
gains through the middle of the
line but threatened at the Marion
gates only once. This is a sum-
mary of the technicalities, but
there were several view point

the spectators could not see.

As this was Marion's first
game, the boys displayed quite a

plays were generally rather rag-

But just you wait until I'm bigger,

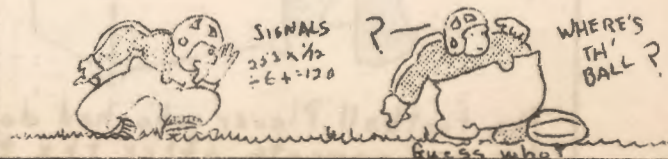
It won't be like this, I figger.
