

Survey of Student Opinion

Halley's sixth hour government class hereby extends its gratitude to the student body and faculty of M. H. S. for its informative, candid opinions expressed on the ballot which we sent forth, except for a few isolated cases, the cooperation was amazing. For popular interest the most important question was that of the presidential race. Willkie won 159 to 135, while Thomas polled 6 votes. The school was practically unanimous in its assent for more social functions and dances. Because of the lack of time, we have broken down only the senior vote. These results are interesting. Thirtyfive students of the senior class voted for Roosevelt, thirty for Willkie and two for Thomas--the girls' vote accounted for the Roosevelt popularity. The majority of students believe their parents will vote the same way. According to senior opinion material aid to Britian should be our foreign policy. Only one senior marred the intelligence of her class by voting for a declaration of war on the Axis Powers. Needless to say, no boys voted such a move: The seniors as well as the rest of the student body overwhelmingly favor conscription of wealth and also of man power. Students by a two-to-one margin believe that conscientious objections should not be forced into military service. We as a student body hereby endorse r more active entra-mural athletic program.

The teachers vote was peculiarlly interesting in the following ways: Roosevelt polled one vote; Thomas, one; and Willkie, five. Two members of our faculty voted for a declaration of war on Germany et-al! They believed 5-2 in draft of industries and 6l in draft of men. Also by 4-3 they believe conscientious objections are no excuse for military

exemption.

Manchester 19 -- Marion 0

Friday night the Marion football team played host to the Manchester Manhawks and as hosts were much too polite to their visitors.

In the first quarter Manchester was on its own goal-line so much that the school board was tempted to turn out the lights on Marion's end of the field. The only time the ball was past midfield was when one of McIntosh's punts went to the forty-four yard line.

The second quarter was the same except that Manchester climaxed a long drive by completing a pass for six points. The try for extra points was wide.

This second half began, and Manchester began to turn on the power. Shoving over one touch the 'third down about midway in quarter, Hattel shook loose and an end around for about thirty yards and McIntosh plowing over for the score. The point after the touchdown was good. Manchester had 13, Marion had 0. In the final period Hattel ripped off another 30 yard dash to push the Manhawks total up to 19 That's that for the points. scoring.

The game was featured by Hattel's slippery gains, Mc-Intosh's plunging and some beautiful punting and running by Marsh. Manchester wasn't nineteen points better, Marion went to sleep once in a while---Man-chester didn't. The Indians were close to paydirt several times but couldn't deliver and with a few breaks, the score would have been a lot different.
