





The third quarter ended with Marion still behind 23-21, because of three Tipton baskets. With but a minute and a half remaining, Marion was out in front 29 to 25, but two quick baskets by Tipton tied the score sending the game into an overtime.

In the overtime Tipton scored first but the score was immediately canceled when Powell made a peach of a twirl shot. The rest of the period was scoreless except for one second but that second proved the margin for Marion's victory. Scott broke down the floor, took the ball, put it up to the basket for the winning two points. The game ended while the ball was in the air.

Meggers, Scott, and Lary played outstanding offensive and defensive ball for Marion. Meggers and Scott had eight points apiece. Tipton's captain was high point man for the night with thirteen points.


Concert
