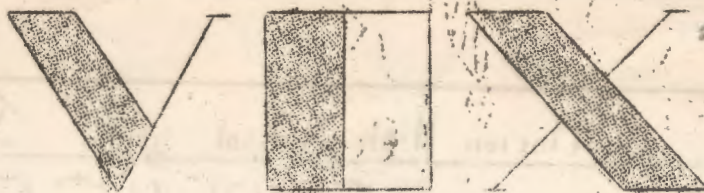

KAREN ANDRE HELD FOR MURDER OF BJORN FAULKNER

Karen Andre, former secretary to Bjorn Faulkner, has been indicted by the grand jury on the charge of having murdered her former employer. On the night of January 16, Bjorn Faulkner's mangled body was found at the foot of the Faulkner Building, the apartment house in which Miss Andre occupies the penthouse. Miss Andre maintains that Mr. Faulkner committed suicide, but there is evidence to support the theory that the financier did not kill himself.

The trial will be held February 20 and 21 in the Lincoln Auditorium at 8:00p.m. with Judge Heath (Mr. Lyman) presiding on the bench. Court will be called to order by the bailiff (Mr. Halley) and the clerk of court (Mrs. Powles) will call the jury members to the box. (These jurors will be selected by lot from the audience at the beginning of the trial.)

Miss Andre (Miss E. Russell) will be defended by Attorney Stevens (Mr. Warren) while Mr. Flint, the district attorney, (played by Mr. Haupt) will battle for a conviction. Both sides have witnesses to support their contentions. Among the witnesses to appear on the stand are the county medical examiner, Dr. Kirkland, (Miss Young); Mrs. John Joseph Hutchins, wife of the Faulkner Building's janitor (Miss Hatch); Mr. Van Fleet, a private detective (Mr. Pantry); Elmer Sweeney, a policeman (Mr. Risse); Nancy Lee Faulkner, widow of Bjorn Faulkner (Miss Schrubbe); her

wealthy father, Mr. Whitfield (Mr. Vernon); Jane Chandler, a New York handwriting expert (Miss Beyer); Magda Svenson, former housekeeper to Faulkner, (Miss J. Russell); Larry Reagan, a gangster (Mr. Coffman); and Sigrid Jungquist, a former employee of Faulkner (Miss Jacobmeyer). The court reporter is Mrs. Bogart and the police matron is Mrs. Snell. The trial is open to the public. Because there is great amount of public opinion on this case, the court room is expected to be well filled.

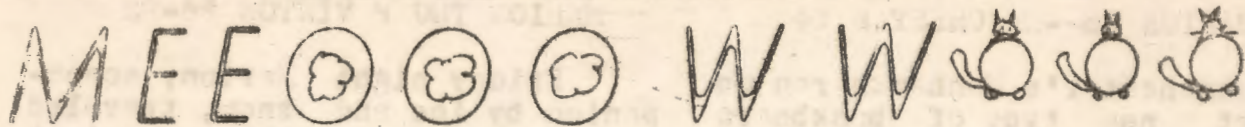

Friday night Marion, accompanied by ice and snow, traveled to Vinton and beat their ancient foes 26-23.

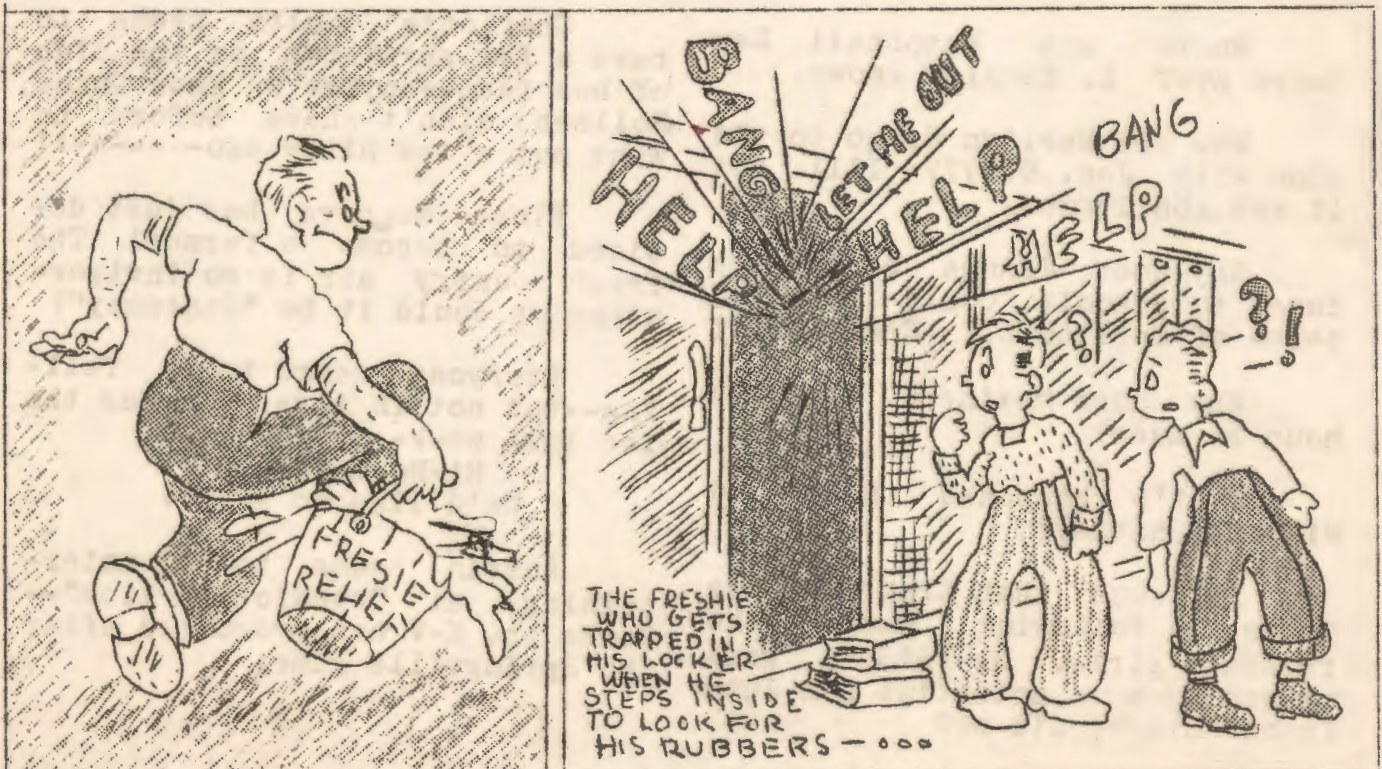
The game was marked with many fouls and sloppy ball handling by both teams. Marion's ball handling the first quarter was the worst yet this year.

Marion and Vinton must have gotten plenty of talking to during the half, because with 2 minutes gone in the second half Marion had 2 baskets and Vinton

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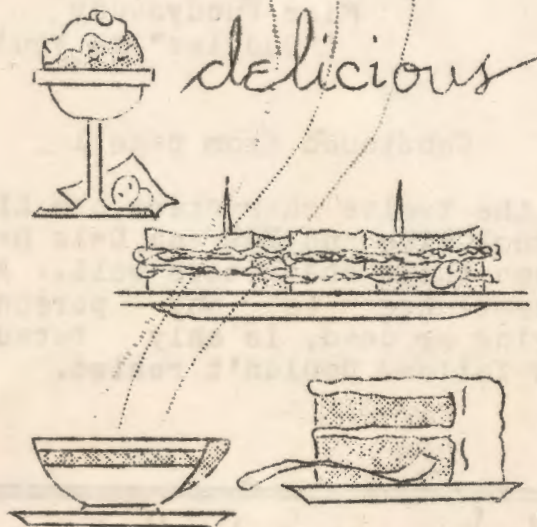
