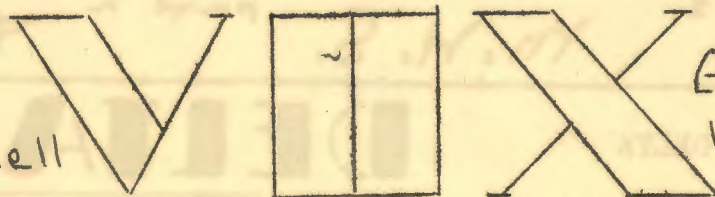

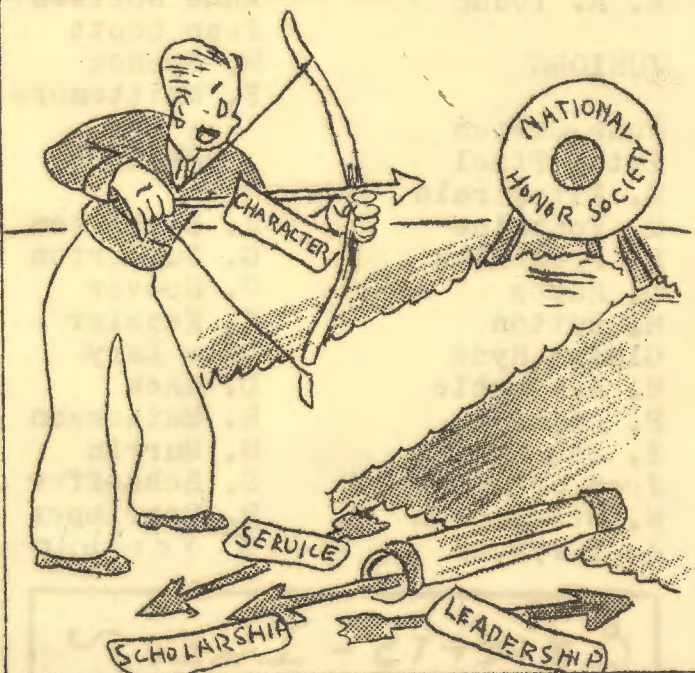

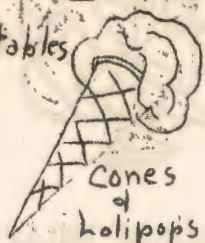

WAR and PACIFISM are the BUNK!

(First in a series of round table discussions on foreign affairs by students of Marion High School)

The foreign situation, according to some of our most noted and supposedly level-headed men in Washington, is becoming increasingly dangerous and precarious to the United States, both economically and militantly. "Why," they assert, "look how the democracies have been literally swallowed up by the dictator nations. One by one they have fallen—first the Checks, then the Poles, followed by the smaller ones. Our turn is next."

And I say BOSH to this assertion. How in the world can it be possible for Hitler and his "chums" to span several thousand miles of the turbulent Atlantic to attack a unified country of 150,000,000 people distributed over our 3,000,000 square miles. It can't be done!! The madman of Germany cannot fly across a mere 20 miles of English channel from bases established from Norway to southern France and take England, a country in size no larger than our own state of Iowa!

Internal strife always breaks up the mightiest of military machines. History proves this. Russia cannot afford to stand by and watch the Balkans trampled by her former enemy anymore than a mother would let her child be harmed. If Joe and Adolph tangle, as I predict if Germany advances through the Balkans, it will check a serious threat of Nazi domination of Europe and possibly Asia.

To repudiate war in general, as the Pacifists do on the ground that it is a bad waste, is just downright silly. In all the world there exists no great nation that has not been built up by wars which have brought in more than they cost, thus being a paying investment. Our very liberty and freedom were bought in the Revolutionary War, to say nothing of the basis for becoming the mightiest nation in the world.

There has to be war in our complicated present day world. This is just plain, practical thinking. No war is too ideal, not practical. By this time we should all get the idea not to be pacifists, not be war mongers, but rather persons willing to face the facts at hand clearly, think them over and act on a level-headed basis without being bitten by the "war hysteria bug." Be in the middle of the road and forget political parties and prejudice.!!!

Why not demand fewer wars and franker ones, smaller and sounder in meaning. If we go to war, let it be strictly for defense only and by defense, I mean only if we here in the Western Hemisphere are attacked. Things can't be done in a day. We should take things easy and let events take their course. Instead of this, we go off half-cocked trying to give the president dictatorial powers and weakening our own defenses by surplus aid to Britain. We are indeed funny people.

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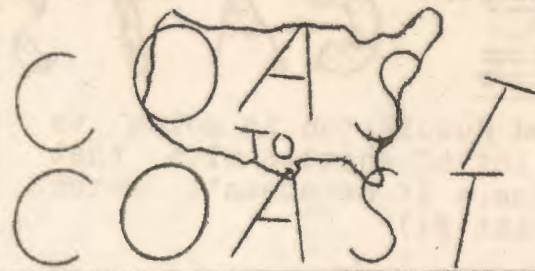
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
