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Mr. Draper of Des Moines visited us last Friday and gave the Juniors and Seniors a series of lectures on 'vocational problems and human relationship.



What I want to know, kid, is just what type of approach would work with him. Since you know all the answers, how about shovin' in your clutch and puttin' me on the beam.


