HOWLCOMING - SSEMBLY



It's a hard-fought first half. We must struggle for every yard. We are all but exhausted as the gun goes off at the half.



The interlude is over. Back to the work and praying and suddenly----


VICTORY!!!! The cars go honking away like so many excited geese proclaiming our team's rewarded efforts.
