Each of us is anticipating in his own way the coming of the most-loved of all holidays. Everyone expects this to be one of the gayest Christmases he has

known for a long time.

But probably already lurking in the future for some one in our school is the dreaded disease tuberculosis. This disease coleims most of its victims from the self-supporting middle class. This hard-working class is not prepared for the expense involved in care and treatment.

The only solution is to have public tuberculosis hospitals care for victims free of charge. This free care should not withheld from people who own their homes or have saved a few hundred dollars for the education of their families. A few states already provide this hospitalization, but Iowa has not yet taken this action. Under our state laws too many middle-class people feel unable to stay in a sanatorium until completely well, because they are unwilling to lose their homes or family security. The Iowa Tuberculosis Association has proposed certain revisions of present laws. Why not study these and talk to your parents about supporting these changes?

We believe that care of all tuberculosis patients is, in part a public responsibility. This means that everyone of us should support the Iowa Tuberculosis Association by buying Christmas seals and by studying the legislative program proposed by this association.

Tuberculosis could make next Christmas a less happy one for any Marion student. Could your family afford to pay for months of care in a sanatorium? helping and protecting others this year, you may be helping yourself.


## "HELP WANTED"

The warm thought of home is little diminished in their minds by the fact that they must return in a few days. The man leaning against the station, talking quietly, is from Merion. probably know him but have not seen him for four years. This year he will be able to spend Christmas with his Marion family again. Only a few weeks ago the pretty girl applying a last-minute dab of lipstick had been cfraid that this year she would be spending her first Christmas &way from her Cedar Rapids home.

In the red brick buildings and white cottages around the station, for weeks these Linn county people have counted the time until Christmas by the noise of the interurban rattling past once each hour. Their life here at Oakdale has been a quiet one, a patient one.

Many of these men and women would not be coming home for Christmas this week had not their cases been caught in time by one of the clinics. The clinics are

established throughout the country for the purpose of discovering tuberculosis in time to prevent it from claiming lives. The Christmas seals we buy each year help immensely in the clinic search for tuberculosis.

This year place the tiny picture of the old-fashioned lamplighter in the corner of every envelope you mail. Show the world you are helping to light the way to health and happy Christmases for other Linn county families.

The Marion Indians started their eage season December 6 with a win over Mt. Vernon.


