Lillian'd like a rope for Francis,


And Betty one for Vic; Molly and Ted seemed satisfied. Marlys would sure like Dick.

The Indians performed beautifully while lacing Tipton 56-

53, here, on February 6.

Tipton, who had won but two games previously, put up a stubborn fight in the first half and, while at no time did they match the Indian points, they threatened to do so several times. In the second half, however, Marion's superior stamina and good sound basketball playing greatly outdistanced the Tipton five.

Still leading for the Marionites was Lloyd Olmstead with 16 points, while Don McConaughy and Dick Smith each tallied 10. Clyde Greve scored 12 for Tipton.

The same victorious tale was repeated as the Little Indians met the Tipton underclassmen--another game, another victory. Jim Bailey led Marion scoring with 13 of the total, which showed Tipton trailing 31-17.

ONWARD MARION!

February 10, the Indians emerged victorious from a roaring cage battle for the thirteenth time this season. This time it was Vinton who bowed respectfully to the tune of 53-39.

All was not as well as the score might indicate, however, since the half-time period registered Vinton 26--Marion 16. fighting Indians came back with a tremendous scoring drive in the second half, and with rebounding and shooting much improved, the Marion quintet left the Jays cold. Trailing 35-32 at the beginning of the fourth period, the Indians got hotter than ever, collecting 18 tallies while Vinton squeezed out 7. Olmstead racked up 15 counters and Smith and McConaughy each collected 10.

With Barrie Gable pulled out for Varsity competition, Jack King took the scoring lead, totaling 18 points. The Little Indians won the tilt, as usual-this time with a 36-21 flavor. NS

The Marion cagers downed Maquoketa Friday, February 13, 44-32. The Marion five started out slowly but picked up momentum as the game progressed. Maquoketa held the lead only once in the game--that was 1-0 in the opening minute.

The Indians led at the intermissions-8-3, 17-8, 28-16, and 44-32. The Cardinals came to life in the fourth period and had the margin narrowed to 32-25 before the Indians could regain their composure, when Olmstead tossed in a free throw and Smith

followed with a fielder.


ASSEMBLIES
