

MARION DIPS SHAMROCKS

The fighting Indians downed a determined St. Patrick's five Monday, February 23, 45-38. The class A sectional basketball tournament went into full swing with 900 riotous spectators wit-

nessing a thriller.

The Shamrocks led at the end of the first canto 12-11. Lloyd Olmstead started his scoring rampage in the second period to put Marion out in front at half-time 26-24. The Shamrocks fought back hard again the third period and held the local cagers to a two point lead. In the final canto the fighting Indians held the St. Patrick's cagers scoreless until after the automatic time-out.

The Indians hit a new peak both offensively and defensively, in the final period to clinch the game 45-38. Olmstead again led the Indians' scoring with

points.

INDIANS SQUEEZE OUT I.C.

The Marion carers downed I.C. Friday, February 27, 27-24 to win the Class A Sectional Tournament. The ireyhounds led the first period 10-4, finding the Indians below their regular ball playing. The Marion cagers took over a low-scoring half-time lead of 13-11 with a free throw and a bucket by Smith, a charity toss by Olmstead and a field goal by McConadary.

The Tidians mintained a 4 point lead three times in the last half, but suittled it to a fighting. Greyhound five. The Marica cagers started to stall the same out with a spoint lead, 26-0, but had it broken up long enough for the Greyhounds to gain two more field goals. Olmstead led the Indians to their 27-24 sectional finals victory with 12 points.

INDIANS SMASH PANTHERS

The Indians blasted Monticello Thursday, March 4, 41-29. A strong man-to-man defense displayed by the Indians held the Panthers to 6 points the first half, giving Merian a 23-6 advan-

The third stanze still found the Indians pointing the tall through the hoop to come out in front 36-11. The final period was left up to the Marian Sophomore Champs. ONE-POINT BLUES

In the finals of the district tournament in the Coe gym Marion fell victim to the pressing defense of the Belle Plaine squade Belle Plaine squeezed past the Indians by a one-point breather, 37-36.

Until the buzzer buzzed its lest, it was anybody's ball game, with the lead changing hands six times and being all-tied-up nine times. With a minute and a quarter left in the fray the score was knotted at 36-all. A Belle Plaine free throw, awarded on Olmstead's fifth foul, was good to complete the scoring for both teams.

The final seconds brought screams and groans from the bleachers as the Indians battled to regain control of the ball. However, the Plainesmen succeeded in their stall, and the final score, a heart-breaker for Marion, was 37-36.

Dick Smith and Lloyd Olmstead were outstanding in the rebounding department, and Olmstead led the scoring for both teams with 12 points. CJK

INDIANS WAMAC & O SECTIONAL CHAMPS O DISTRICT HONOR MISSED IN ONE POINT DEFEAT

For the first time since 1938 Marion's cage quintet has topped a conference. The season looked not-too-bright in the openers, when Mount Vernon and Anamosa handed the Indians two successive defeats.

Undaunted by these, the Indians started a winning streak that included the gridiron rival, Anamosa. The Raiders' defeat put Marion at the top of the conference along with Anamosa. If that record could be held, the Indians could capture the conference trophy.

Hopes for the championship title were dampened immediately, however, by the uprising of Independence, who furnished the Indians with their second loop defeat. But the splurge by Independence toppled Anamosa from their vantage point and gave the locals a golden opportunity to grab the title--which they did.

For the first time in history an Indian basketball team has walked off with a Sectional Trophy. The '47-'48 squad did just that by eliminating Immaculate Conception of Cedar Rapids in the Sectional finals held on the Marion court, February 21.

Hopes for entering the Sub-State Tourneys soared as Monticello tumbled in the wake of the Indian victory march, but the fighting Belle Plaine five, after rolling Anamosa in the preliminaries, came up as a "dark horse" and edged out the local lads by a mere point.

In the Cedar Rapids--Marion scoring race Marion had 3 top-scoring boys in the first fifteen, one of whom led the point getting with 293 tallies.

Lloyd Olmstead, a junior, led the contest with an excel-

lent scoring average. He is 6'3" tall and his deadly set-shooting as forward put the Indians on the winning list more than once.

Dick Smith, fifth amongst the high scorers, is 6'4" tall and a senior. He has been coming up all during his cage career and this year his consistent rebounding from the center position contributed immensly to the Indians' success.

Don McConaughy, also among the fifteen scoring masters, is a senior and has always played a good game of basketball. Don is a good shot on offense and though he plays forward, he is also a "tops" on defense.

Don Whittemore, guard, has been a key figure in both foot-ball and basketball and has played good ball during this year's cage season.

Kenny Otting, a junior, also has been active on both the gridiron and the hardcourt. Kenny has won the respect of all who watch him in action. We'll all look forward to seeing him again.

Dave Hender came from Kalona to finish his high school career at Marion. Playing guard, he was out of the latter part of the season because of illness. Even so, as on the football field, he showed that he is a good athlete.

Bob Page, because of the football mishap, was handicapped by getting a late start in the season, but nevertheless showed his old "spark" was not gone and played his part well during his time on the floor.

Sincere congratulations from the student body to a grand bunch of guys for a thrilling season!
