Were you ever asked "What school do you go to?" and perhaps you said simply, "Marion," thinking that if you had said the name of another school, say, a school in a big city or somewhere, they might have given it and you a second thought? Did you ever stop to think about your school and how fortunate you are in belonging to it?

For instance, did you know that in the Recent-Social-ana-Scientific-Development tests we took this year, Marion averaged approximately 92 percent as their percentile rank out of 107 Class B schools in Iowa? The Freshmen made the highest with 97 percent, the Sophomores had the lowest with 80 percent, and the Juniors and Seniors tied with 96 percent.

Look at the music departments. For approximately the last ten years, Girls' Glee Club, Boys' Glee Club, and Mixed Chorus won firsts in both district and state contests. The instrumental department also won firsts in all of the contests they attended.

Marion was outstanding in athletics this year, too. They won the WaMac conference for basketball and two of our boys were on the first string of the All-WaMac Basketball Team, two on the second string, and one received honorable mention. In football they won second in the WaMac conference.

We also have many organizations where membership is open to all students interested in their objectives--such as, Science Club, Dramatic Club, Hi-Y, G. A. A., VOX Staff, Honor Society, Commercial Club, and the Quill Staff.

Some people boast about their talents. Let's not be boastful--just proud of M. H. S. talents and accomplishments. Therefore, M. H. S. students, haven't we reason to "toot our horn"?

VOX WINS NATIONAL HONOR

The <u>Vox</u>, Marion High School paper, has been judged as one of four national winners from Iowa in the eleventh annual School Press Project sponsored by the National Tuberculosis Association, the Tuberculosis Association of Iowa, and the Columbia Scholastic Press Association.

Sixty-six high school newspapers from Iowa entered the School Press Project which was conducted last fall and winter. Twenty-six won state honors, the nine best being sent to New York for possible national honors.

Certificates of Honor from the National and Iowa Tuberculosis Associations will be presented to the staff of the Vox by a representative of the Linn County Tuberculosis Association.

The winning entry was from the November issue of <u>Vox</u> on "How My School Can Help Prevent Tuber-culosis", by John Snell. LB

Gather round, chillun, and you shall hear of the second annual Big 10 Ball, sponsored by the GAA.


This attempt to honor the ten most outstanding students in MHS also provides a good excuse for the gals to trot out their long party dresses.

INDIAN THIN CLADS AT STATE MEET

Six early season runners of Marion attended the State Class A indoor meet at Iowa City, March 28.

They entered in five events which were all distance and middle distance races. Of the five events, three finished no less than fourth. The events entered were: the two-mile relay, mile relay, mile run (Ray Petersen), 880-yard run (Neil Wood), and the 440-yard run (Ted Nofal).

The two-mile relay team consisting of Charles Daws, Norman Severinsen, John Jellison, and Ray Petersen grabbed top honors and a gold medal for each team member. Ray Petersen was given fourth in the mile run after much dispute about third and fourth place winners. The mile relay team, with Charles Daws, Norman Severinsen, Ted Nofal, and John Jellison, copped fourth place. NS

26 SCHOOLS ENTER MARION RELAYS

Despite a high wind the day for the annual Marion Relays, held on April 10, was pleasant, and five records tumbled.

New records were set in the 440-relay and the 880-relay by Teachers High of Cedar Falls, the Class C mile relay by Wellman, the pole vault by U. High of Iowa City, and the high jump by West Waterloo High.

Teachers High walked off with highest honors as they took home trophys won in the 440, 880, and 432-yard low hurdle shuttle relays.

One medal and one trophy of the many offered were captured by Indian thin-clads. Dick Jeffrey won the discus throw and the two-mile relay scored again by easily winning that event. Neil Wood, Norman Severinsen, John Jellison, and Ray Petersen composed the quartet. The mile relay (Daws, Severinsen, Dick Jeffrey, and John Jellison) ran in second place.

The Indians also took fourth in the medley relay, and fourth in the 432-yard low hurdle shuttle.

CEDAR FALLS RELAYS

Five Indian runners represented Marion in the Twenty-fifth Annual Cedar Falls Relays, Saturday, April 17. Marion entered in the two-mile and the mile relay, finishing fourth and second respectively. The two-mile relay, Daws, Severinsen, composed of Jellison, and Petersen, got its first defeat of the season. The finished close on each field other's heels with no team at any time having a considerable lead. The event was won by Nevada--last year's defending champion.

The mile relay team was D. Jeffrey, Petersen, Daws and Jellison. Anchor man Jellison brought the team from third place into the second place position. Cedar Falls won the event finishing about twenty yards ahead of Marion.

The strong wind saved a lot of the records from being broken, but five records tumbled and two were tied.
