


### VOX STAFF 1947-1948

(Priests' March again) Tell old man world


To open wide his gate.

TABLE TENNIS



The opener was a civil war with Seventh Avenue split between the North and the South. As in the other Civil War, the North


won a decisive victory.

Marion tracksters second place at the annual Vinton Relays. Cedar Falls Teachers High won the meet with 83 points, and Marion finished second with

46 points.

The two-mile relay team of Severinsen, Daws, Jellison, and Petersen smashed the relay record by breaking the tape in 8:54.9. Marion captured third in the pole vault, fifth in the low hurdles, fourth in the high jump, second and fifth in the high hurdles, and placed in both the football throw and the discus.

The Indians grabbed a third the shuttle and medley relay and speeded on to a second in the mile relay and fifth in the 880 A total of eight records were broken by the star-packed field of contestants.

One point told the story and Marion lost a Triangular meet to Tipton, 85 to 84. The Indians played host to Tipton and Maquo-

keta on Tuesday, April 27.

Marion relay teams easily outdistanced Tipton and Maguoketa. but the tale was told in the field events where Marion took only one of the six. Tipton won the other five.

Indians garnered 66 The points in the relay events as compared to 49 for Tipton. quoketa did not place a first in any event.

Taking eleven out of seventeen events, Marion raced to an easy win over Mt. Vernon and Monticello in a Triangular meet here on April 29. The Indians'

101 points easily out-distanced Mt. Vernon's 50 and Monticello's 38.

Loren Raddatz claimed high hurdles, Ray Petersen the mile run, and Dick Krog the 200yard low hurdles and the pole vault.

With Dick Krog pulling the most points for the winners, Marion trounced Independence and Vinton in a triangular meet on the Indian track Tuesday afternoon, May 4. The points read like this: Marion, 90 1/6; Independence, 40; and Vinton, 38 5/6.

Marion took firsts in the high hurdles, mile run, 440-yard dash, 200-yard low hurdles, 880yard run, medley relay, mile relay, football throw, and the high jump.

The District Track Meet held at Marion on May 8 was led by a strong team from Iowa City High, Iowa City. The Little Hawks managed to pile up a total of 58 Roosevelt of Cedar Rappoints. ids was second with 54.

The Marion Indians placed in eight events to score 22 points for eighth place. The placing events were the two-mile relay, pole vault, high jump, football throw, high hurdles, 880-yard run, 440-yard relay, and the mile relay. RP



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
