


Indian's Widen Margin

Marion continued her unbeaten streak by swamping Manchester at Manchester Friday night. Despite the score it was not the Marion kind of ball we saw until the second half when the Indians really dug in and made it a ball game.

A Marion drive early in the first quarter ended abruptly when a fumble was recovered by Manchester. Through-out the game both teams were hampered by fumbles, often at crucial times.

Again in the second quarter Marion fumbled, this time on the Manchester eight yard line. The Manhawks fumbled it back, Fisher recovering on their six-inch line. Ratliff took it across for six points.

A passing offense ending with a pass from Ratliff to Otting plus the extra point by Williams brought it to 13-0.

Otting opened the second half for Marion by streaking 70 yards on a punt return for a TD. A Manchester punt blocked by Fisher on the Manchester 16 set Marion up for another score on a charge by Rathje.

Twice more Otting scored, the latter by a pass interception.

In the fourth quarter a punt blocked by Palmer bounced back for an automatic safety making the score 42-0.

Marion's scoring ended by a TD by Mc-Gowan plus the extra point by Williams which brought the score up to 49-0. GM

Editorial

Halloween is the time for editorials, speeches, and campaigns condemning the destructive attitude which many young people hold toward the personal property of others at this time of the year. Assuming, however, that the students of Marion High are above reproach on this matter, I should like to discuss another, more insidious form of destructiveness which, regrettably, confines itself to no day or age group. This is the habit of destructive criticism, to the practice of which most of us fall prey nearly every day. More specifically, I refer to the atti-tude which causes us to attack judgment of others, or to make adverse comment upon any person or project without offerconstructive suggestions. That is destructive criticism. and it has a more deleterious effect upon progress than perhaps any other mental attitude.

Criticism fostered by a sincere wish for betterment is, however, in no sense to be condemned, Constructive criticism is the attitude upon which modern science and learning, even our

very way of life, is based. A moment of thought should be sufficient to convince you of the truth of that statement and to show you that destruction can be wrought every bit as effectively by unbased criticism as by physical violence. The foundation of any person's ability and usefulness is his faith in himself. If that faith is destroyed by destructive criticism of his efforts or decisions, his whole outlook may be so changed that he becomes unable to give freely of his talents, and the world is denied what progress he might have achieved. I should like to suggest that a sincere self-examination by each of us might bring dividends of better cooperation and more accomplishment in our various school activities.



Don't you think it might be fun?








