The "citizens" of Marion High "exercised their franchise" in a mock election held Tuesday, November 2, the results of which proved to be a surprisingly accurate mirror of the nation's voting trend. Timed to coincide with the nationwide general elections, the student vote was the brain child of Mr. Robert Walthire, senior government instructor. The purpose of the election was to help teach the students correct voting procedure, and ballots used were copies of the official city ballot. Members of Mr. Waltmire's government classes served as party judges and clerks.

An outstanding feature of the school balloting was the accuracy with which its results followed the national popular vote. The outcomes of at least three major political contests were correctly predicted, the elections of Truman for President, Gillette for Senator

and Beardsley for Governor being forecast.

In the Presidential race between Democrat Harry Truman and Republican Thomas Dewey practically all "expert" pre-election forecasts had shown a significant popular preference for the Republican candidate. The Institute of Public Opinion, directed by Dr. George Gallup, gave Dewey 50 percent of the popular vote to Truman's 45 percent. The Fortune Magazine poll, conducted by Elmo Roper, was even more one-sided, predicting a 52 percent to 37 percent split for Dewey and Truman respectively. In each poll the remaining percentage was to go to minor party candi-

The M.H.S. voters gave 126 to Truman, 108 to Dewey, 19 to Wallace, and 3 to other candidates. The percentages, 49 percent for Truman and 42 percent for Dewey, much more nearly appropriate to Page 4

Marion Bows
To Tipton

Marion lost its only game of the season at Tipton Friday, November 5, by a 13-7 count. Both teams were hindered by a muddy field and a cold intermittent rain.

Tipton took advantage of the first break as Jim Williams, Tiger halfback, grabbed a fumble in midair and raced 20 yards for the touchdown. Marion's passing attack brought the ball to Tipton's 9-yard line as the halftime gun sounded.

The Indians took the lead in the third quarter as Ken Otting hit pay-dirt from the one. Tipton roared back to clinch the game in the fourth, fullback Hilbert Ford scoring from the one.

The Tigers, who have won six conference games against no losses, are the 1948 WaMaC Conference champions. Marion's 6-1 record assures the Indians of second place.

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Health Poll And Services Some enlightening statistics resulted from a poll of the student body concerning health and nutrition habits. Published and sponsored by the Institute of Student Opinion of Scholastic Magazine, the poll was taken in MHS on November 10. There were 160 boys to 145 girls who filled out the ballots.

According to the official tabulation, 261 students had eaten breakfast on the morning of the poll while 44 students had not. Only 13 of this latter group were boys. Though the boys appear from the results to be heavier eaters than the girls, the fair sex, the girls ate more between breakfast and lunch.



And of whom they had no fear.


