Marion Sweeps Past Blue Raiders

The Marion Indians opened their WaMaC conference schedule Tuesday, December 7, by trouncing Anamosa 47-25.

The Blue Raiders, although inexperienced, gained some recognition by holding Lanky Lloyd Olmstead to nine points. There seemed to be a lid on the basket all evening for the tall center who was able to hit on only two shots. But he made up for this with his superb defensive and offensive rebounding.

The Indians led all the way, but not until the fourth period was the game really put on ice. The first period ended 13-7 with fairly even scoring. At half-time the lead was widened to 22-14 with the Indians still on top.

The third period was all Marion's with hitting the Raiders only two field goals while the Indians racked up 14 points. Many substitutions

marked the fourth peand the game riod ended 47-25.

Barrie Gable all scoring with 13 points, while George Beardsley of Anamosa tallied 11 for the losers.

The Anamosa Freshman-Sophomores tripped up the Little Indians 27-24. Bob Williams was high for Marion with 10 tallies.

The Tragedy of Christmas, 1948

The blast thundered down the street rocking walls, narrow shattering windows, and choking the air with a deadly hail of jagged brick and searing metal. The woman lay behind the rude sand-bag shelter for a short moment after the reverberations had died away and then struggled resolutely to her feet, her badly frightened but unharmed baby boy in her arms. After calming her babe as best she could she resumed her lonely trek through the rubble to her home, forcing her weary steps lest nightfall should find her alone on the streets. The day had been a tedious, disappointing round of pushing and jostling with hundreds of other hungry people who had gathered in the square to haggle over the all too inadequate foodstuffs and meager clothing being offered for sale by the black market and, perhaps, stealing a loaf of black bread or a pair of sandals that she might not return to her home empty-handed. If, indeed, her home had not by now been taken from her as had so recently been taken her husband and eldest son.

Such is Christmas Eve, 1948, in Jerusalem. Such episodes will be pitifully common in that area this year on the anniversary of the birth, in that same land, of another baby boy to another Jewish mother nearly 2000 years ago. Now, after 20 centuries of "progress" in the relations of man to man and man to God, the homeland of the Prince of Peace is one of the world's bloody battlegrounds.

We may find these thoughts repugnant to the sense of cheer and gaiety which most of us rightly feel at Christmas time, but let us not forget that the people of Palestine have no choice but to face this problem. The people of China and Greece

MARLYS: Look! Here is a special delivery letter from



In the state team mile, Mally, Edmunds, and Dean took 5th, 8th and 10th places respectively to score second as a team.

Later in a trimeet mile and one-half run with Tipton and U. High of Iowa City, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th places were taken by Mally, Edmunds, Hollingsworth, Dean, and Hotz in that order.

The climax was the capture of the state two-mile meet at Iowa City by Marion's squad. Mally's second place with Edmunds at 3rd and Dean at 5th scored ten points for Marion. Nevada placed with second 19. In team events the lowest score wins. These deserve boys much credit for the determination and courage which it took to win.



Mt. Wernon Game

Led by last year's scoring ace, Lloyd Olmstead, who tallied 25 points, the Marion Indians downed their first foe of the season by a 17 point margin.

Marion drew first blood and lead at the

quarter, 15-12.

The determined Mount Vernon club came right back and twice in the second quarter tied the Marion outfit but allowed a 19-17 lead at the half.

During the third period both teams began pouring them in, Mount Vernon tying the score but never taking the lead. Finally Marion came through to lead 34-27 at the third quarter.

Mount Vernon was unable to threaten a-gain. Final score: 51-34.

Sparked by the sharp shooting of Lloyd Olmstead, Marion outplayed a taller Wilson team on Friday, November 3, defeating them 56 to 43.
