
Play Cast Revealed


Arrangements have been made for the Marion--Immaculate Conception game to be played in the Coe gym Wednesday night at 7:30.


~ Present Play~



Marion's mighty Indians overwhelmed Vinton 56-30 at the Marion gym Tuesday, February It 8. was the fifteenth win in as many starts for the powerful Indians.

Marion fought hard for a 12-6 first quarter lead. Olmstead hit 8 of these points.

Coach Hipple's gang had easier going the second quarter. With even scoring and plenty of teamwork the Indians managed a 23-11 half-time lead.

Vinton had a warmer third quarter but couldn't keep up Marion's pace. It was Olmstead again as Marion went to a 40-22 third period lead.

The Indians had no trouble watching the solemn Jays in the last period. Reserves finished out the contest for Marion.

Long Lloyd Olmstead paced the Marion victory, putting in 25 tallies. Jack Fry hit 13 for the losers.

The little Indians had to battle a tough Vinton team to win 29-22. Again it was the star sophomore, Bob Williams, who hit 18 points for Marion, while Jim Roster collected 9 for the Jays.

Maquoketa

The Marion Indians invaded Maquoketa's home floor Friday, February 12, to add a 56 to 35 victory to their already swollen string.

Maquoketa drew first blood and held a 2-0 lead until, after a minute and half of play had ensued, Olmstead dropped in a free throw. Still Maquoketa held on to a one or two point lead until, in the final two minutes of the quarter, Marion kicked up a 16-8 lead.

Hampered by penalties, Maquoketa fell farther behind in the second canto to be caught twelve points behind at the half. (30-18)

The remainder of the game consisted largely of penalties, with several Maquoketa players fouling out during the closing minutes. Final score again--56-55.
