ADIANS FALL TO MONTE Height Advantage Tells Tale

The Marion Indioutfought, outans played, and outclassed a rangy Montezuma five for three quarters. lost their touch in the closing minutes, and dropped their first game of the season 41-39 in the final round of the sub-state tournament.

The game was played in the Iowa fieldhouse March 11. and throngs of Marion's fans flocked to Iowa City to watch the greatest basketball team in Marion's athletic history battle the only team between them and the state tournament. But for the first time this season in a long string of 24 contests the Indians had to settle for a defeat.

IN MYS CORNER


Marion High is proud to say that they have two fine boxers, Larry Yauslin and Jerry Jeffrey. There are a lot of us who know little or nothing about boxing, so we asked the boys about it.


Larry started boxing because he thought it a fine art to know and his father introduced him to a trainer. Jerry went with Larry to work out in the Quaker gym and this got Jerry started boxing. When you "work out" you do roadwork, calisthentics, use the punching bag, and spar. Chet Graylund trained both boys, but Bud Booth and Earl Carr helped train Larry.

The novice class is restricted to boxers who have never been in a district tournament, like the Cedar Rapids Golden Gloves, or boxers who haven't had more than five decision fights. The open class is for any amateur boxer. You should be at least sixteen years old, and, if you are under twenty-one you have to have your parents' signature before you can fight.

They wrap the boxers hands before they put on gloves, even when they are working out. For this they use canvas wraps, but in a real fight they use plenty of gauze. They put a rubber tooth protector in your mouth.

Larry said about boxing, "It is just like singing a solo or giving a speech, you get plenty scared."
