Following the dinner, which was served in the Community House, Pops Harrison, the University of Iowa basketball coach, spoke about Murray Wier and the "little guys" on the team. Then the all-conference teams were presented. Those honored with first-team berths include three Marion players, Lloyd Olmstead, Kenny Otting, and Barrie Gable.

## Lanky Lloyd

### All State

### Forward

Lloyd Olmstead, Marion's star basketball player, has achieved the highest possible honor by being named to the first string, IDPA All State basketball team. Kenny Otting and Barrie Gable, teammates, were given honorable mention.

Lloyd, who was also honored with a berth on the WamAC all-conference team, rated a position on Jack North's Des Moines Register second team.

During the season, Olmstead tossed 126 buckets through the hoop on 345 attempts for a 36.6 percentage and an average of 14.1 points per game. He scored 86 of his 134 free throw attempts to give him an average of 64.2 percent. His total points scored for the season are 338.

We shall probably be hearing a lot about Lloyd next year when he will be playing for Cornell College.

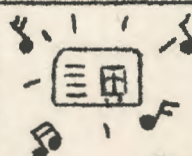

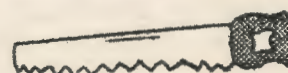

Why does Dean B. call Twyla H. "Bones"?

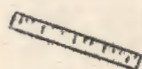

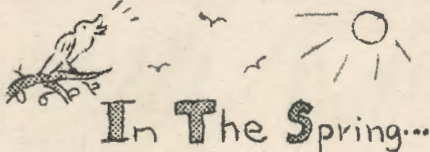
## Athletic Banquet
