

For Marion


Perry

Roger Hutchinson's reserved laugh will no longer be heard down the halls.







Don Swartzendruber of Wellman, although not up to his usual form, netted a trio of victories that helped his school take fourth place in the Class B division.

Roosevelt had a hard time beating out Loras for the Class A title, as the final scores indicate, the Rough Riders having 60 1/6 points to 59 by Loras. U. High, on the other hand, had a comparatively easy time and whipped its nearest competitor by 40 points.

The two top teams or men in each division will compete in the state meet at Ames. Ken Otting, who scored 280 points in the football throw, will represent our Indians

at that meet.
