


MARION DIPS

The Marion Indians added another victory to their WaMac championship belt Friday, October 6, by downing the Anamosa Blue Raiders, 32-7.

The first Indian score was in the making when on an Anamosa fourth down, a bad hike from center sent the ball to the kicker's left, and bouncing back into their own territory to the ll-yard line. The Indians then showed their fire-power when three plays later Merritt went around to the left for the first TD. The first quarter soon ended with the score Marion, 6- Anamosa, 0. During the second quarter both teams waged a see-saw battle with neither able to score before the half ended.

After the half-time

intermission the scoring race was on. The Raiders kicked off to the Marion 23. The Indians then began their march upfield deep into Raider territory, where Seeks found a hole and tore across the goal. The Indians then kicked to the Raiders' 33. Two plays later Seeks scooped up an Anamosa fumble and again found himself crossing the goal line. The Indians kicked off to the Anamosa 25. However, the Raiders had not given up hope as they retaliated with a pass from former Marionite Bob Williams to Purcell, who raced some 60 yards for the Raiders' first TD. Norton's conversion was good. Soon the third quarter ended with the score reading Marion, 19- Anamosa, 7.

The Indians again hopped on the scoring train as they moved the ball downfield where Merritt dived through the Anamosa line for six additional points. The Raiders, now desperate, took to the air, but a pass intercepted by Oakley was touchdown bound as he ran some 55 yards for the final Marion TD. Lundquist's conversion added still another point to make the final score read Marion,



Mr. Saur, social studies teacher, was born and raised in Elkader. His main activities in high school were athletics and playing a trumpet in the school band.


Music continued as his main interest at Coe College, where he played in a dance band and so earned some of his way through school. World War II found Mr. Saur a member of the U.S. Navy.

INDIANS LOSE OPENER

Fumbles told the tale as the Marion Indians opened their 1950 football season with Oelwein Friday, September 15. The final score was Oelwein, 12—Marion, 7.

As the minutes of the first quarter ticked by, both teams waged a see-saw battle with neither team able to score by the end of that period. During second quarter the Oelwein 11 threatened to score, but a tough Marion defense forced them to lose the ball on downs. As the Indians started their march upfield, the fumbled was bounced back into the end zone, where Smith of Oelwein fell on it for the first touchdown. The try for the extra point failed. The half soon ended with the score reading wein, 6--Marion, 0.

After the half-time intermission, the Indians moved the ball up field and were about to cross the goal line when the pigskin was fumbled, Oelwein recovered. and Marion's However, big break came in the fourth period when a pass from Bristol to Leffingwell was successful. The conversion was also good. Many a Marion fan thought the game was over when the Indians blocked an Oelwein punt on the 35 and began driving toward the goal. However, Fate stepped in as the Indians fumbled the ball, and Oelwein's Droste picked it up and ran 65

yards for a TD. The point after touchdown was unsuccessful. In the closing minutes various Indian passes failed, and Oelwein went ahead to win, 12-7.

INDIANS SIDETRACK PANTHERS

Remembering their 26-26 tie with Monticello a year ago, the Marion Indians sidetracked the Monti Panthers 19-0 Friday, September 29.

During the early part of the first period many a fan thought that shades of the Oelwein game were present, as the Indians started the fumbling which two weeks earlier had led them to a 12-7 defeat. However, the Indians soon cooled down and took to the air, as two passes from Bristol to Leffingwell took the ball downfield to the 16yard line. Captain George Palmer, switching from his usual role of tackle to fullback position, the carried the ball to the nine. This play ended the first quarter with the score reading Marion, 0-Monticello. O.

On the next play Russ Seeks bounded over for the Indians' first TD. conversion was blocked, but an offside penalty against the Panthers gave the Indians another chance, which this time was good. Forcing the Panthers to lose the ball on downs, the Indians took possession of the ball, after which fullback Ed Merritt found a hole and carried the pigskin 57 yards for the second touchdown. conversion was unsuccessful. The Indians again threatened to score as they blocked a Monti punt on

the seven. However, the Panther line held, and the Indians failed to score. The half ended with Marion leading 13-0.

The third TD of the evening was in the making, as Novotny took the pigskin into the end zone. However, a clipping penalty against Marion brought the ball back. Later the Indians found themselves knocking at Monticello's goal line. An aerial from Seeks to Tudeen upped the Marion score another six points. A stubborn Marion defense kept the Panthers from scoring during the rest of the game.
