

Several hours were also devoted to practicing for the evening concert in which two bands played: the massed band of approximately 60 musicians from all the WaMac schools, and the selected band of outstanding musicians from each school.

Marjorie Lala was chosen outstanding brass soloist of the day. The outstanding woodwind soloist, the outstanding brass group, and the outstanding woodwind group were also selected.

Directors for the day were Mr. Frank A. Piersol, Iowa State College, and Mr. Gordon Bird from Drake University.

#### GUM CHEWING BECOMES A CHALLENGE






If you see Donna Lathrop floating around the halls with a dreamy look in her eyes, maybe it's because she has just received a letter from a certain some-body.

A capacity crowd witnessed a close fourth quarter as the Monticello Panthers staged a comeback in their game with the Indians Tuesday, January 9. After seeing the Panthers come within three points of their lead, the Indians were able to pull to a 57-50 win.

As expected, the game ran close all the way with Marion gathering a 12-7
