

"THE IVORY DOOR" PLAYERS GIVE GOOD PERFORMANCE

The Marion Indians clinched their fourth Wa-Mac basketball crown Friday, February 16, by smashing the Monticello Panthers, 72-53. In the last two years the Panthers had provided a warm reception for the Indians-Marion winning by only one or two points, but the third time broke the cham.

The first quarter was a see-saw battle with Mar-

The Little Indians also claimed another victory by downing the Monti squad, 53-20. Lang topped the Indians' scoring with 17.

After a sensational season in which he sparked Marion to the top of the Wa-Mac, conference, Hugh Leffingwell broke into the headlines with a 41 point outburst against Monticello. This topped the Cedar Rapids-Marion single game scoring record.

Named Prep of the Week by the Des Moines Register, Hugh also set a new consecutive free throw mark for one game by hitting 17 in a row against Monticello. Added to one in the Manchester game and four against Tipton, he still hasn't missed his last 22 shots. This shatters a previous unofficial state record of 21 in a row. Congratulations, Hugh!

MARINE CORPS ENCOURAGES STUDENTS TO FINISH SCHOOL

Captain Elery G. Poppe, Officer in charge of Marine Corps Recruiting in Iowa, has urged young men to complete high school before applying for enlistment in the Marine Corps. He stated that it has been a long standing policy of the Marine Corps to encourage young men to complete all requirements for high school graduation before joining.

This statement could very easily apply to any branch of the service. For education is as important as fighting in the front lines. Today the need for well educated men and women is greater than ever before. Our government could not function properly if the men now in charge of the various departments had not had a full and extensive education.


In giving his opinion on the subject, Captain Poppe stated, "The Marine Corps feels that it gains a great deal through such a policy since the more education a man has, the better Marine he will make." He also explained that a high school education is important in the Marine Corps, because it permits better classification and assignment of personnel. It is far easier to determine the proper assignment for a man who has indicated his aptitudes through extended schooling than for a man who can offer no such evidence of his interests and abilities.

SECTIONAL CHAMPIONS

The Marion Indians broke back into the winning column Friday, February 23, in the sectional tourney at Alburnett, by defeating Coggon, 63-44.

The game started with Marion jumping to an early

lead. Cog-Scoring gon soon Leffingwell 33 whittled it 8 down to four Seeks Peck 4 points, 19-Novotny 4 15. Roby 3 Indians then Christensen 2 pulled away Christensen 2 to a 23-15 2 first quar-Hayes 2 ter lead, Gipp Lundquist 2 and were Oakley 1 never in danger a-

gain. Taking over shortly after the beginning of the second period, the sophs and reserves ran this to a 41-25 half-time lead.

The varsity regulars played most of the third quarter and pulled away to a 51-31 lead. Then the reserves finished the game out with the final score reading Marion, 63--Cog-gon, 144.

MARION SLAPS MANCHESTER

Marion's Indians continued on the warpath, as they took their 18th scalp in a row by dumping the Manchester Manhawks, 61-38, Tuesday, February 13, in the Indian gym.

Marion started the game with a quick burst but soon cooled down as Manchester warmed up. The Indians were leading at

Keeping right in step, the Indian sophs dumped the Manchester sophs, 46-26. Novotny led the Papooses with 15.

MARION SLIPS PAST VINTON

Vinton forced the Indians into their first overtime in three years Tuesday, February 6; but the determined Indians kept their place at the top of the WaMaC standings by defeating the Jays, 58-55.

TIPTON DROPS MARION

By hitting an incredible 52% of their shots, a revenge seeking Tipton quintet upset Marion's applecant by handing them their first defeat of the season, 50-46, on the local floor February 20. It was Marion's first loss in 42 WaMaC conference games.

After the Tigers had grabbed a quick 8-2 lead, Marion came back to within

Marion hit for a quick two points for their last lead of the game. The Tigers bounded back to lead at the half 24-21. Staying from 3-7 points ahead, Tipton held a 39-34 advantage at the end of the third quarter. Marion rallied briefly in the 4th canto, but the lads from Tipton would not be denied, as they clung to a four point bulge at the final gun.

Novotny's basket in the last 15 seconds gave the Marion sophs a 29-28 victory over Tipton and clinched the WaMaC conference title. Novotny and Lang led Marion with 6.
