


ENSEMBLE CLUB



What strange fascination does red hair hold for Ronnie L??


Jimmy H.'s fan club includes; sophomores, juniors, and seniors. Don't walk freshmen, run!!

SPORTS

INDIANS WIN OPENER, 32-13

Marion won its first football game this year by defeating Oelwein 32-13 on the Oelwein athletic field, Friday, September, 14, before a near capacity crowd.

The Indians received the kickoff and despite a 13 yard setback, marched down the field to the ten yard line with Marvin Novotny carrying the ball over for a touchdown. The quarter ended with Marion leading 6-0.

Starting on the Oelwein 33, the Indians rolled up another six points, with Leffingwell possessor of the pigskin this time. The second half ended with Marion on the long end of a 12-0 score.

The third period saw Oelwein turn several miscues into Indian touchdown. Marion returned with two touchdowns of their own by Seeks and Novotny, with passes to Peck and Oakley for the extra points. An intercepted pass by Jim Hayes and a 60 yard runback set up the fourth touchdown. With the score 26-6 in the last period, Oelwein scored their second and last touchdown. The conversion was good, making it 26-13. Seeks carried it over, late in the fourth quarter, but the conversion failed. Reserves played the last four minutes and the team came home with a 32-13 victory. FIRST CONFERENCE VICTORY

Friday night, September 21, with a drizzle of rain hampering both teams, Marion came through with their first conference victory by defeating Maquoketa 12-2.

In the first quarter, Novotny plunged over the goal line, after an 11 yard run, to set the Indians out in front 6-0. A blocked Maquoketa punt in the second period set up another score with Russ Seeks scoring this time from the 6 yard line. This made the score 12-0.

In the fourth quarter Maquoketa began dominating the play. They scored a safety when Ronnie Waters blocked a Marion punt and the ball rolled out of the end zone. These two points constituted the only Maquoketa scoring throughout the entire game. Maquoketa did, however, score a touchdown in the last 3 minutes of play; but it was nullified by a clipping penalty. When the final gun sounded, Marion was out on top with a 12-2 score.

MARION DOWNS ANAMOSA IN FOURTH QUARTER

Russ Seeks, playing with a dislocated shoulder, sparked Marion to two fourth quarter touchdowns to whip Anamosa 13-7, Friday night, September 28.

Anamosa's dangerous Ditch brother's passing combination kept Marion off balance throughout the first half. Midway in the second period, the Blue Raiders sustained a march to the Indian's 34 where Arnie Ditch passed to brother Terry for a 7-0 halftime bulge.

scoreless After a third quarter Marv Novopowered over from four yards out to open the fourth frame. The extra point by Seeks tied it at 7 all. Three minutes later Leffingwell intercepted an Anamosa pass on the Raider's 26. A pass and a tremendous run by Seeks put the ball on the one yard line, where Hayes plunged over to give the Indians a 13-7 triumph.

MARION RAPS MONTI, 31-0

Marion remained the only undefeated team in the WaMaC by dropping Monticello Friday, October 5, at the Panther homecoming, 31-0.

The Indians scored two times in the first quarter and once in each remaining period. Seeks and Mary Novotny each went over on short plunges in the opening quarter, and Peck's conversion made it 13-0. pass from Leffingwell to Peck gave Marion another six points in the second quarter.

In the second half Jim Hayes went over from the eight; and Bob Fox carried from the four to run the score to 31-0 at the final gun.
