Betsey Wachal and JoAnn LaBarge have been receiving a lot of mail postmarked Mount Vernon and Hawaii lately.



Spring brings new life to all the world New hope to all the land. The world responds like magic To this touch from God's own hand.



LOOKING BACK

Now that the basketball season is officially over, let's take a look at some of the records compiled by this and past years' teams.

Marion has not always held the prestige for producing outstanding basketball teams. In fact. 1947 - 48 was the first highly successful season in 20 years for the school. That year the Indians finished with a 16-2 record and won the conference crown.

Since that time Marion has won 137 games while losing only 13, and has won six consecutive championships in WaMaC play.

The 1949-50 squad accomplished a feat that no other Marion team before them had been able to dothey reached the state tournament finals. Again in 1952, Marion reached the state tournament finals. Each time the Indians were beaten in the quarterfinal round.

This year's squad, though losing in the substate play, has the consolation of being beaten by the eventual state champion, in what was probably the toughest and closest game of the season for either school.

Surely Marion holds one of the most impressive records in the state — if not the most. We should be proud of our record; our coach, and our school, and strive to maintain our position as an outstanding producer of fine teams.

It could have been my imagination, but somewhere in the hall I heard the strains of the funeral march echoing.


The best part of track, so they tell us, is that wonderful feeling that comes to you after those invigorating calisthenics! It is said that some don't give all they have to this part of it. How about that......
