The flowers spring from their autumn beds,


To blink their eyes and nod their heads.

WHO'S WHO AROUND M.H.S.


This month we present the Junior class vice-president, Barbara Dunlap, and Junior class president, Robert Fernow.



Lois Lacock and Verle Miller seem to like each other's acquaintance.


Dallas likes to wear girl's neck scarves.

Muscatine gained its first Towa high school basketball championship in 27 years when Earl Gantenbein and his Muskies defeated a great Roosevelt of Des Moines team.

With the outstanding play of the Muskies starring forward, Gene Schroeder, Roosevelt was downed in the last quarter, enabling Muscatine to win by a score of 67-53.

In the first round of play, Council Bluffs won over Carroll in an overtime by a score of 69-67, Hull took Fertile 54-43, Muscatine slaughtered Slater 70-45, East Waterloo defeated Winfield 59-37, Roosevelt of Des Moines downed Grinnell 65-50, Paullina beat Independence in an overtime, 62-56, and Wheatland took Wales-Lincoln 45-43.

In the final round, A. L. of Council Bluffs beat Paullina, and Roosevelt was taken into camp by Muscatine, making a fast and furious 1954 Iowa State Basketball Tourney.
