
Baccalaureate Will Be Held May 23

Don't forget to come to the evening show of the Eastern Iowa Band Festival to see the Marion band and our queen candidate.


This is the last VOX issue put out by us. WHOOPEE!!! Peace at last.

The age of the graduates will be:

Most of the Senior girls will attend the University or Iowa State Teachers College. The girls plan to be: secretaries, nurses, teachers, and of course, housewives.




SENIORS' MEMORIES OF M.H.S. TEACHERS

THE CONTEST RECORD 1950-54

During the past five years, the band and vocal departments have won forty-eight firsts in state contests. Ensembles, solos, glee clubs, choruses, and bands are included in this number.

Fourteen soloists and eleven ensembles have won firsts for the band department, while three concert

bands and one marching band have also won.

In the vocal department, three soloists, five ensembles, and eleven large groups have brought home firsts.

In 1950 the band had two winning soloists and two winning ensembles. In 1951 there were two soloists and one ensemble that won. The concert band also won that year. 1952 was a poor year as only one soloist and no groups won a first rating at

state. 1953, however, set a new record as six soloists, three ensembles, and the concert band brought home a division I. A new record was set this year for the number of M.H.S. band ensembles that won a first. Five ensembles, three soloists won at the state contests at Newton. Marching band and concert band also won.

The vocal department in 1950 had one soloist

Chief cooks LaBarge and Novak fed the starving members their former criticisms and mixtures of the blood, sweat, and tears shed by nineteen former VOX


GOOD LUCK SENIORS — ARPS staffs. As the week progressed, everyone was too busy to eat or sleep except the ex-staff members, who spent their leisure time racing up and down the hall on motor scooters. THEY confessed that THEY had to control their pity for the messengers who begged to ride, too. With great effort THEY kicked them in the face and rode on ringing their bells, which played "Onward Marion".

On Friday morning the VOX editors, stumbling over their dead and wounded, brought the finished product to their masters. The other workers clutched their copies to their hearts, as those who didn't have subscriptions pleaded in vain for a sample of their labors.

It was heartbreaking to see the staff sob as the ex-staff made their comments--"Twenty-five pages of gossip isn't enough," "They've postponed this," "Why don't you have more features?"

When I passed 309 late that evening a light was on. I peeked in, and what to my wondering eyes should appear, but twenty-five editors working on the next issue. As I gazed on their prostrate forms, I vowed I would think twice before speaking against any school paper. Then I made my way home, knowing that the revolt had been justified.

Many years have passed since the revolt, but buzzing still issues from M.H.S., and many have been the times that I've heard the groans of agony. Then my mind wanders back to 9:00 a.m., Friday, April 30, 1954, and the REVOLT!
