There are twenty nominees waiting to be initiated into the club.



Eileen and Kay have a big job as co-editors of the 1954-55 Quill, but both seem to find time for outside activities.





A tough line stalled a Maquoketa attack, as Marion won 9-0, October 8. The game was more lopsided than the score indicates, as the Indians were stopped thrice on the 15 yard line.

Marion's lone counter was set up on a 32 yard run through the Cardinals' line. Failor then threw an aerial to Robison in the end Zone. Altenberg converted.

The Indians slammed the Cards back for two successive losses to the l yard line. On one play, the runner fumbled and recovered in the end zone, but it was quickly pounced on by several Marion players.

The offensive forward wall has a knack of relaxing inside the 15 yard line which they will have to get rid of before they meet Anamosa.
