How does this concern us? Our people are blessed with the necessities and luxuries of life. We have spread our "good will" among our people. Are any of our people dying on the battlefield?

One-fourth of the population of the United States is believed to be infected with tuberculosis. This dread disease costs the American people \$600,000,000 a year. The battle against tuberculosis is not a doctor's problem. A successful program depends on a well-informed, cooperative public and adequate funds. It belongs to the ENTIRE public.

Come December, we are bombarded with, "And what do you want Santa to bring you?" No wonder we decide Christmas is "what you get". Let's be sure we realize that the joy of Christmas lies not alone in what we receive, but also in what we do for others.

The National Tuberculosis Association needs YOUR help. The fight against tuberculosis belongs to the nation. Support the 1954 Christmas seal campaign wholeheartedly.

If we help to achieve the campaign goal, we shall be able to repeat the Christmas "good will toward men" not only with our lips, but with our minds and our hearts, too.

Adventure Continues

Prevention, not cure alone, is the goal of doctors today. Countless millions are indebted for their lives to the men of science who have fought tuberculosis.

T.B. was known before the stethoscope, germs, the microscope, and the x-ray were known.

Robert Fernow was installed December 11 as Master Counselor of the Linn Chapter No. 900 Order Carl Adkins of DeMolay. and Bob Murray were installed as Senior and Junior Counselors respectively. Robert French, Bruce Boling, and Don Morrison were the installing officers.

Following the installation the DeMolay members, the Rainbow Girls, and guests were entertained at a dance. The boys' quartet provided music during the installation.

Experiment after experiment was carried on while many people continued to die from it. Finally the "rest cure" was discovered quite unintentionally. It was the basic treatment around which the Trudeau Sanatorium was built in the Adirondack Mountains.

Today, instead of each doctor working separately, there is a united front against T.B. The adventure is not over. Tuberculosis can only be controlled, not conquered. Methods of diagnosis and treatment are being perfected, and the fight is open to the keen minds of future scientists. scientists are marching forward in all directions which should lead to victory-the elimination of tuberculosis.

Carol Whitmer ('5h) is in Washington, D. C., working as a stenographer in the Navy department.






WHO'S WHO IN M.H.S.

Lack of bench strength was a prime factor in the loss. After Darell Failor and Dal Fairley fouled out, Springville just walked away. Final score was Springville 68, Marion 56.

Bouncing back after the Springville game, Marion cleaned the Mustangs 63-27 on the Mt. Vernon floor.

Mt. Vernon's biggest scoring quarter was the fourth when Marion's subs were in.

Using a stall the last minute of play, the Indians beat the Wilson Ramblers of Cedar Rapids 45-42 at Coe on November 26.

Using speed to overcome Wilson's towering height, the Indians ran the Ramblers to death. Failor was high for Marion with 11 points scored.

Marion fans were wondering, December 10, how Independence found so many giants in one school, as the Indians floored one of the WaMaC's tallest squads, 55-46.

Led by 6'6" Ron Ehler, listed among the country's top five hundred preps by a sports magazine, Independence is rated as a top contender in the WaMaC race.
