


Last Tuesday night Mc-Kinley played Marion, Marion came out on top here, too. This made them eligible for Friday nights game. The score was 70-51.

Mike Kepros (154) is in the Navy and is stationed at the Great Lakes Naval Training Center.


Marilyn Tritle ('54) is attending the St. Luke's Nursing School in Cedar Rapids.


This month we present Betty Ann Rinderknecht, Vox editor, and Jim Kimber,

The halls of M.H.S. some bring interesting comment to an interested listener. Naturally, comments center on basketball, ranging from the new uniforms to the present tournament setup.

Marion, long the best dressed tournament team, sported new red warmup jerseys for the I.C. game. They feature an Iowa map with Marion starred on the back of the uniform.

Amid cries from the reformists that Marion's cheering section still is not what it should be come the players' reports that marked improvement was noticed during the McKinley contest. If yelling on the REGULAR yells at the games stays as good as the pep assemblies, little more can be desired

Although there has been the usual amount of gripes, the refs in the sectionals, on the whole, did a pretty fair job. Congratulations are in order for Sophomores Smith and Wilson for making the tournament

squad.

There were some loud laments from C. R. when Marion was announced as the sectional site. Those who protested said that the Indians not only would have the "home court advantage", but that the crowd attracted by the annual Marion-I.C. would overflow the capacity of the gym 'here at Marion.

Marion won over a tough Anamosa squad 75-57, January 25, in the Indian's gym. During the first and second quarters it looked as if it were going to be a fight to the finish. But fast breaks and reserve strength in the last half made the difference, and Marion went on to win.

Monticello had leads up to thirteen points January 29, at Monticello, but a persistent Marion five whittled down the lead until finally midway in the third period Marion took the lead and sewed it up in the final two minutes of play. At the buzzer the score stood 79-71.

In a close hardfought, overtime battle, Marion fell to Independence, 56-55. The lead shifted back and forth quite a few times, and the game was tied several times. At the end of regular play the score stood In the overtime 53-53 • Independence took the lead 56-53, then Marion pulled it up to 56-55, but although they had several more shots at the basket, the boys couldn't get the winning one in.

Marion cinched a share of the WaMaC title by beating Manchester 84-51. Marion's defense was much improved over the Independence game. The boys hit a very good 44.8 per cent of their shots while Manchester only put in 30.5 per cent.
