The VOX, Marion High School's school newspaper, received a first class excellent rating in the National Scholastic Survey for the first semester's work. This critical service is sponsored by the National Scholastic Press Association at the University of Minnesota.

The judge commented on the VOX being an outstanding paper and made special mention of the sports section. A guidebook was enclosed which contained a summary chart of scores and honor ratings that enables each of the schools to compare its papers with others in its own classification. The critical analysis by the judge is summarized in the guidebook. These criticisms are given to help the staff improve their second semester issues.

The honor rating certificate will be sent to the staff sometime in May and will be published in the May issue of Scholastic Editor.


The Science Club really worked hard, and let's show how grateful we are by doing our share in keeping the new lawn in good condition.

Marion barely squeezed by an unusually strong Mt. Vernon track team. 80-72. Belle Plaine was third with 47 points. Though Marion won the meet, numerous Indian weaknesses were pointed out.

The Hipplemen, who were hampered by an unusually strong wind, won the two mile relay, 400 yard dash, low hurdles, mile relay, 880 relay, and broad jump. However, the absence of good milers and half-milers, who could run under 2:10, and hurdlers was very apparent in the track events. As usual, Marion is still way below par in field events. The Indian team must really improve if there is any hope of the conference trophy.

Bob Maly and Dave Williams have received a considerable amount of publicity thus far, but not without cause. The two boys are doing a nice job for Freshmen. Marion's star sprinter and broad jumper, Ron Altenberg, has been absent from workouts for the past week with an

injured foot.

There is a rumor that the conference track meet may be moved up a week. With this comes word from Monticello that their team includes 19 Seniors. Our squad has five Seniors, two of whom are lettermen.
