Spring is busting out all over. Certain Freshman girls have acquired class rings lately; Nancy, Marlene, and Joyce to be specific.


The F.F.A. boys are making plans for a trip to Florida this summer. As of now there are sixteen members who hope to go.

Vinton was the setting this year for the state music contest with 1700 students participating in vocal and instrumental solos and small groups:


Marion received a total of 31 firsts, 25 in band, 5 in vocal music, and 1 in piano solo competition.
