New Intercom System

Mr. Fowler was recently interviewed concerning the new intercom system which has been installed in our school. The new system was to have been completed prior to the opening of school, but there was a delay in the arrival of parts caused by the war in VietNam.

A master control unit is located in the office. This control system has an AM and FM radio and a record player. Mr. Fowler is able to read the morning announcements and other special bulletins in the main office and they can be heard in all classrooms. This system replaces the dial phone system that has now been removed.

There is one speaker in each room and in each hall and six speakers in the boys gym.

Music is piped through the building before school and during the lunch hours music is enjoyed in the gym.

We're Off To A Good Start

This year so far has been a good year for Mr. Fowler. He said, "There isn't much I am dissatisfied with this year, but the halls and the school grounds sometimes get too noisy. Also the students this year seem to have a lot of spirit, enthusiasm, and are eager to learn."

Mr. Fowler reports there are 98 boys and 88 girls, 186 total, in the seventh grade. This is the largest class at C. B. Vernon. The eighth grade class is next with 178 students, 84 boys and 94 girls. Smallest class with an enrollment of 164 is the ninth grade class. Girls outnumber the boys in that class 85 to 79.

There are twenty-one teachers, two guidance counselors, two physical education instructors, and one librarian.

This year is a good year and if we keep up the good work this may be the best year Mr. Fowler has had at this school.

Ited Tests

The Iowa Tests of Educational Development are given once a year to all high school students including ninth graders. The areas covered by the ITED test are approximately the same as those covered in the Basic Skills test, but the ITED test is a more advanced and comprehensive test. The ITED test measures the educational advancement of each student and a comparison is then drawn with other pupils in this state and in the nation.

These tests were given to all ninth grade students September 28 and 29.

WaMac Teachers Institute Held

The WaMac Teachers Institute was held in Marion on Monday, October 10. Approximately 800 teachers representing all the schools in the WaMac Conference attended. Schools represented were Monticello, Maquoketa, Tipton, Anamosa, Vinton, Manchester, Independence, and Marion.

A general meeting was held in the morning and in the afternoon the teachers worked in small groups and exchanged ideas.




