John Nieland Spoke To 7th, 9th Grades



Sgt. John Nieland, a 1958 graduate of the Marion High School, was a guest speaker November 30 and December 1 in our junior high. He spoke to us on his work as a member of the Green Beret Special



Sergeant John Nieland of the Green Beret Special Forces came to C.B. Vernon Junior High November 30 to talk with the seventh grade social studies classes about his work as a Green Beret. He brought with him some of his medals, such as the Purple Heart and the Silver Star which is the third highest medal you can receive. He also brought some photographs showing him with Senator Robert Kennedy. Diane Ward re-ceived a Green Beret for asking Sgt. Nieland the best question.

At a special ninth grade assembly held December 1, Sgt. Nieland stressed the importance of studying hard while in junior high and senior high school. He explained that tests we take later on in our line of work may determine whether we are in the front line fighting or in a higher position. The background information and facts we obtain in school will help us do better on these tests.
