What's Going

With Christmas vacation rapidly approaching, students and teachers are busy in classes trying to complete various assign-

ments and units before December 22. Seventh grade art classes have many projects in the making. Some are currently using the potter's wheel; many are involved with charcoal drawings,

pastel drawings, and string painting. Seventh grade music classes are studying the Baroque period. They have completed their study of Renaissance music.

DATE FUDGE

1 12-oz. package semi-sweet chocolate pieces

4 cup sweetened condensed milk

1 tablespoon water

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 8-oz. package Bordo imported diced dates

Melt chocolate pieces in top of double boiler over hot, not boiling, water.

Remove from heat.

Stir in remaining ingredients and mix until smooth.

Pour into greased loaf pan, approximately 8" x 4".

Cool, and cut into squares to

DATE MARSHMALLOWS 2 tablespoons unflavored gelatin

¼ cup cold water

34 cup boiling water

2 cups sugar

pinch salt

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 8-oz. package Bordo imported diced dates

Place gelatin in 2 quart bowl, add cold water and mix. Let stand until all water is absorbed.

Add sugar to boiling water and cook until mixture reaches the soft ball stage.*

Add vanilla and salt to gelatin.

Pour boiled syrup slowly over gelatin mixture, beating constantly with a wire whisk until mixture is cool and thick.

Add Bordo diced dates and mix. Butter a shallow 9" x 9" pan and dust with confectioners' sugar.

Pour in mixture and let stand overnight.

Cut into squares and roll in confectioners' sugar before serving.

"(*Soft ball stage=238°F on your candy thermometer, or when a small amount of the boiling sugar and water mixture forms a soft ball when dropped into a glass of cold water.)
