## Vernon Jr. Hi. PTA Holds Panel Discussion



An assembly on Liquid Air was given Friday, March 22, by Mr. Kuhns of the University of Minnesota, Mr. Kuhns is a scientist, and he showed what liquid air will do to different materials. He pointed out the dangers involved in playing with liquid air. Liquid air is so cold it

will burn just as badly as something very hot would. The temperature of liquid air is approximately 360 degrees below freezing (32 degrees). Liquid air may cause fires if it comes in consecutivity contains the con tact with certain other chemicals. Today it is widely used in the space program for sending men into space.
