#### Enrollment Reaches 566

The school year is now well into the first quarter and things at Vernon are progressing very nicely. The students are adjusting very well to life at Vernon Junior High, and Mr. Fowler feels we will be having another fine and rewarding school year.

One of our major problems, according to Mr. Fowler, is the large number of students which really tax the facilities of the building. At the present time we have a total of 566 students enrolled, with 191 of these in seventh grade, 191 in grade eight, and 184 in our ninth grade class. We are again using one room in Lincoln Building to help relieve some of the pressure.

Mr. Fowler stated, "Even though we are crowded I know that if the enthusiasm and cooperation that the student body has shown through these first weeks of school continue to be shown, we cannot help but have an extremely fine school year.
