Mrs. Pumroy To Spend Summer In Spain

Mrs. Pumroy is going to Spain! Mrs. Pumroy will spend the summer in Spain as a participant in the American Institute of Foreign Study. Teachers are selected to chaperone groups of students who attend. Students from 16 years to 19 years are eligible to participate in the program. Each teacher will be in charge of 8 to 15 students.

Mrs. Pumroy's group will leave from Cedar Rapids. At the present time, her group consists of one Marion student, Jan Renfer, and students from North Linn and Prairie schools.

Participants will spend several days touring New York City before leaving for Spain. The first two days will be spent in Madrid touring the city.

The group will then go to the University of Santiago de Compostella in Santiago, Galicia. They will spend four weeks going to school in the morning, studying Spanish exclusively. In the aftermoons they will be touring the country side and learning about the civilization of Spain. learning about the civilization of Spain. On weekends they will be visiting the visit a bull fighting farm (where they will try their skills at bull fighting) and go to a bull fight.

Upon completion of their studies, the group will tour the western and sourthern areas of Spain. The last weekend they will cross the Strait of Gibralter and go to Tangiers, then return to Malaga, and finally return to the United States.

Spanish Club is also sponsoring a Sloppy Joe Day Dance for eighth and ninth gra-


