Friday, February 13, lucky for some and unlucky for others, a Valentine's dance was held in the boys' gym from 3:45 until 5:15.




Records were played, and punch and cookies were served.






Eighth grade basketball team members are shown in action in one of the recent home games.




Scarfs tied around the head and hanging down the side are in fashion. The scarf may be long or short, and of silk or knitted materials.
