the eighth graders.




Others did plays about gamblers, hard-ships of the life of women, an old pros-pector's life, and traveling in the cover-

Some drew pictures and told stories from


the pictures they drew.
Some students decided they would rather live in the pioneers' ways. They have had a very enjoyable experience.






Typical social studies projects for the unit on the Westward Movement.
