From then on, until he was 15, he worked on a farm near Lisbon taking care of and milking (by hand) 10 cows each morning and evening for his board and room plus some

After he graduated from high school, he worked on a huge government irriga-

tion project on the Mexican border in Southern California. The following year he attended ISU at Ames, where he was severely injured playing football. Later, after a long stay in the hospital, he was fortunate enough to be selected for a surveying team loaned to the Mexican government. They laid out the present highway from Juarez to Mexico

Following the surveying, he was selected for a professional football team in

Southern California, where he played 3 seasons. The football heads would line up jobs for the football players during the off-season times, and Mr. Schley worked in Oregon in a lumber camp cutting big trees, in Wyoming in an oil field, and in Nevada in a lead-silver mine. He also became a professional boxer and earned and saved enough money from football and boxing to go back to college in the fall of 1935.

of misuse by students in past years.





How do Camera Club members develop film? They use a special procedure. First film? They use a special procedure. First they develop the negatives. They take a small can which the negative is in, pour developer in it, and leave it for 11 minutes, checking it every 2 minutes. When they finish that, they drain the developer and pour the "stop" in. Then they pour that out and pour fixer in and leave it for 10 to 15 minutes. They then take the negatives out, wash them, and hang them up to dry. them up to dry.

The procedure of developing prints is as follows. First, the negatives are placed in an enlarger light to determine the time the paper should be exposed for a proper picture. Once the time element is determined, pictures can be printed. Af-ter the light has been on it for a matter of second, the paper is put in the developer and left in it until the picture is developed all the way. Then it is put in the "stop" that stops the developing process. It is next placed in the fixer, which fixes it and preserves the print. Then the print is taken out of the fixer, put in the sink, and sprayed with water for about 10 minutes. Later, the paper dryer drys the print and gives you the picture you see and use.
