Mr. Russell explained that he has little trouble understanding operators around the world, since Europeans are more proficient in foreign

languages than Americans -- most speak English. Mr. Russell speaks several languages. He also did some communicating with an operator in California using Morse Code.



Larry Groce Was A Pleasant Guest

Larry Groce, 27, a versatile performer who
sings and plays the dulcimer, guitar, and mandolin, recently visited Vernon Middle School
as "artist in residence." The Iowa Arts Council made it possible, along with our own district, to spend a week with the 6th grade students, beadening their murical awareness by dents, broadening their musical awareness by dents, broadening their musical awareness by helping them write original songs, Mr. Groce is noted for this, and he has worked with such people as Helen Reddy, Crystal Gayle, Captain and Tennille, and Seals and Crofts. He has appeared on many programs including Johnny Carson, the Midnight Special, and American Bandstand. He has made Il albums; the idea for one of his most famous songs, "Jumk Food Junkie," camd from his 14-year-old brother.

Mr. Groce, a Dallas native started his career in high school, singing for the "Raggedy Sometime Band." After receiving a degree in literature, he recorded his first album. Most of his original material is quite unique in that it uses such topics as frogs, bumper stickers, and everyday life. Perhaps this quality and his concern for students, have made him one of this country's most famous student entertainers and helped him to be recognized early in life by the National Endowment for the Arts.

After completing his stay here, he will return to his home in West Virginia to record another album and to continue making himself available for further concerts, such as the one he presented at the Marion High School which culminated his work here and showed off some of Vemon's students' songs.
