Last November, on Friday, the second, Robbie Zier, his father, and nine other men left at 2:30 p.m. for Hullet, Wyoming. The trip was 900 miles long (22 hours). The purpose-to go into the wilderness to hunt for deer.

After arriving the first day, they unpacked, made beds, and headed out to hunt. Supplies they had taken included clothes, food, propane tanks, propane lamps, high-powered rifles, ammunition, and sleeping bags. They hunted two miles northwest of Hullet, in the wilderness, their shelter being an old house.

I asked Robbie if he hunted every day. "I hunted every day for about ten hours," I asked him if he shot any deer. "Heck, no."

MR. DOLINAJ RUNS!

Mr. Dolinaj has been running conscientiously since the second week of last March. He runs daily from approximately 1 hour to 1 1/4 hours. He will either run home from work, a distance of about 8 miles, or run before school in the morning. On weekends, he tries to run 15 miles a day, and on Sundays he will reach 20.

Running is hard work, according to Mr. Dolinaj, and there is pain involved also. He has lost 45 pound since beginning his training.

Mr. Dolinaj has run in the following events: Central YMCA Memorial Day 10,000 Meter, Marion American Legion Post 10-Miler, a 5-mile Mt. Vernon race (2nd), the Armstrong's 10,000 Meter in CR (3rd), the Amana 10,000 Meter (2nd), a marathon in Minneapolis (which he finished in 2 hours, 52 minutes--40th in age group and 122 out of 1500 runners), Iowa City Marathon (half-marathon), and the Marion Turkey Trot (2nd in age group and 4th overall). He has won 4 medals, a wool Amana shirt, and several certificates.

One goal has been to run under a 6-minute mile, which he accomplished in the Turkey Trot (5:45). Another goal has been to qualify for the Boston Marathon.

Sunday night is "the big one" for prime time TV viewing, with 98.39 million Americans tuning in.

Even though Robbie didn't get any deer, the other men did. His dad got one, and each of the others got one. In all, the whole group got 10.

While hunting, they ate cookies, ham, chicken, hamburgers, and boiled deer hearts. They also did some sight-seeing--Wall Drug in South Dakota and Devil's Tower in Wyoming.

Although the weather was nice most of the time, it did snow a couple of times, and it was also windy at times.

When they returned a week later, they took the deer to Mt. Vernon to be boned, and then took it to Pohlenas in CR to be made into deer bologna.

I've tried some of the bologna, and it's pretty good.
